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Welcome to American Literature!!!!

In this course we will be exploring the significant literary developments in American literary history. We will determine what makes American literature distinctly American; we will examine issues which have developed from America's establishment, growth, and maturation. This course will also focus on the connection between American literature and society.

We will begin our study of American literature with *The Scarlet Letter* by Nathaniel Hawthorne. The Text is commonly considered to be a classic in American Literature and many scholars reason it to be the first "truly American novel." Although Hawthorne wrote the book in the mid-1800s, the themes addressed in the novel are timeless. People have constantly been concerned with justice, forgiveness, hypocrisy, revenge, and love. In our exploration of American literature, Hawthorne's novel will set us on a course of examining the particularly American conflict between individuality and societal expectations.

Read and annotate the following work:

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
2. The Scarlet Letter Visual Component-Due date: 16th of August

1. Select a letter that has dual meaning for an important character in the novel. Think of two adjectives or nouns that begin with this letter and apply to the character. These words must convey a sense of duality, or opposition (though they need not be direct antonyms).

2. Prepare a visual with the character's name and letter in the center and your choice of significant words and supporting passages on either side and below. See the sample for arrangement guidelines. You may use the letter A, but you may not use the words "adultery/adulterer" or "angelic" with Hester Prynne.

3. If the connection between the passage and the word is obvious, you need not explain it. If a viewer needs the connection interpreted, please provide a short explanation, directly on the visual arrangement.

Guideline for the visual component



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3.Write a character analysis essay-Due date: First day of school

Directions: Address each of the following categories described below.

- Name of Character and Novel in which the character appears.
- Physical Characteristics (Voice, Posture/Walk/Demeanor/Dress, Distinguishing Marks, Gestures/Emotion etc.)
- Background (Family life/Character's History, Occupation, Personal interests/pursuits, Beliefs)
- Motivations/Purpose (For the entire novel—is this person successful or unsuccessful; fails or succeeds)
- Development or Changes in Character (Throughout the course of the novel)
- Tactics/Will (Conflict with self/nature/man/society? Threatening others? Strong or weak willpower? Moral responsibility to others? Honest with self and others?)
- Judgement (View of character in eyes of others, i.e., author, society, other characters, etc.)

Suggested format for the essay

1.Introduction:

Make it brief and meaningful. It should hold together your whole essay and should spark interest in people. Write a short description of the character in question.

2.Body:

Subdivide your body paragraphs into different ideas or areas to be considered regarding the character. The body should answer the following questions:

-What is the character's physical appearance, personality, and background?

-What were the conflicts that the character experienced and how did he/she overcome them? -What can we learn from this character?

3.Conclusion:

Your conclusion should also hold together your ideas and should shape a final analysis statement. Mention things about the character's conflicts which we can experience in real life. Also, you can write about how a character should've reacted to a certain situation.

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
